

Natural Enemies of Crop Pests in Hawai'i



What to look for

Minute pirate bugs (Orius) are found on a wide range of crops. As generalist predators in both the nymph and adult stages, they attack almost anything small enough for them to handle. When prey are not available, they feed on pollen and plant juices, so look for them in corn silks and where there are spring and summer-flowering shrubs and weeds.

Minute Pirate Bugs

(predators)

Appearance

Adults are small, 1/16–1/8 inch, and black, with white X- shaped patches on their wings. They are very mobile.

Orius Nymphs are yelloworange or brown and teardrop-shaped.

Crops protected

greenhouse crops sweet corn beans tomato and many others

Pests attacked

insect eggs small caterpillars thrips mites aphids

Minute Pirate Bugs

Minute pirate bug nymphs and adults can consume 30 or more spider mites per day. They are voracious predators on thrips. *Orius* have been observed feeding on leafhopper nymphs in corn. Reducing use of broad-spectrum insecticidal sprays helps to protect populations of these predators. Also, planting spring and summerflowering plants will help them survive periods of scarce prey.

Predators

Predators are beneficial insects that attack, kill, or consume a wide variety of common pests. Males, females, immatures, and adults may all be predatory. Predators include lacewings, flies, spiders, beetles, true bugs, and predatory mites.



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
